#### North Newton's Path to Re-Entry (Revised 9-28-21)

The North Newton School Corporation understands that a return to instruction in some form or fashion is what is best for our students. Additionally, our first priority is the safety and health of our students and staff during this COVID-19 pandemic. As a result, this plan helps to reinforce specific provisions and considerations that have been, and continue to be undertaken to help ensure that the health and safety needs of our staff and students are addressed to the best of our ability.

Over the past twelve months, much has been learned about COVID-19 and our abilities to pivot in many areas to keep school open and running. All staff should be commended on their adherence to guidelines, in reinforcing protective measures and following the North Newton Path to Re-Entry.

Administrators in the district have been quite adept and skilled in quarantining students and staff, conducing testing, contact tracing and doing everything within their power to keep school open. These lessons learned will serve us well as we look to return for the 2021-2022 school year.

Based upon parent and staff feedback, and information received from Governor Eric Holcomb, CDC guidelines and recommendations, and the Newton County Health Department, the North Newton School Corporation will continue in-person instruction as scheduled starting Friday, August 13, 2021 with increased precautions in place PENDING Low/No Spread of the COVID-19 disease. Should infections in our county, area or state increase, we will proceed to the second phase of our plan as noted for minimal/moderate spread. Information from state and local experts will continue to be the driving force behind all decisions to conduct school and the models that are utilized.

It is recommended to the North Newton School Board of Trustees, that all students K-12 return to all in-person instruction and no Virtual Learning to be offered.

The Indiana Department of Health has recently given schools latitude to implement mask requirements which allow close contacts of positive individuals to monitor for symptoms if everyone is masked (9-3-21 ISHD guidance). To avoid significant numbers of students and staff to quarantine, North Newton will implement the following:

If a building reaches 1% positive for COVID-19, masks will be required for everyone (vaccinated and un-vaccinated) in the building for at least 30 days from the last documented positive case that required contact tracing. Close contacts within 3 feet of positive case will be notified to



monitor for symptoms for 14 days. If symptoms develop, individuals will isolate and get tested, whether fully vaccinated or not. Applies to the classroom setting only. Does not apply to high-risk activities such as lunch, band, choir or extra-curriculars (ISHD 9-3-21).

- Remain vigilant and purposeful as they determine roles, responsibilities, and reporting requirements for staff, refraining from blanket reporting requirements
- Leverage virtual tools and platforms wherever possible to conduct essential business and keep in-person reporting to an absolute minimum during school closures

- preventative measures (including staying home when sick), good hygiene, and school/district specific protocols.
- Follow protocol for students/staff who feel ill/experience symptoms when they come to school

- Establish a protocol for student pick/drop up: staggered entry and release (by grade, class, or bus numbers), marked spacing for pickup

- Provide hand sanitizer for students and staff
- Limit unnecessary congregations of students and staff
- Schedule restroom breaks to avoid overcrowding when possible
- Post signage in classrooms, hallways, and entrances to communicate how to stop the spread. COVID-19 symptoms, preventative measures (including staying home when sick), good hygiene, and school/district specific protocols
- Adhere to protocol for students/staff who feel ill/experience symptoms when they come to school

#### When a Child, Staff Member, or Visitor **Becomes Sick at School**



District/School School administrators, school nurses, and other healthcare providers to identify an isolation room or area to separate Considerations: anyone who exhibits COVID-like symptoms, while they are waiting for pickup. The room needs to be disinfected frequently and restricted to authorized staff/students.

- Establish procedures for safely transporting anyone who is sick home or to a healthcare facility.
- Notify local health officials, staff, and families immediately of a possible case while maintaining confidentiality consistent with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and other applicable federal and state privacy laws.
- Close off areas used by a sick person and do not use before cleaning and disinfection.

Advise sick staff members and children not to return until they have met state DPH criteria to discontinue home isolation Inform those who have had close contact to a person diagnosed with COVID-19 to stay home and follow state DPH guidance if symptoms develop. If a person does not have symptoms, follow appropriate state DPH guidance for home quarantine.

# **Faculty and Staff** Support **Exclusion from School and Return**

#### **District and School Considerations:**

- o Faculty and Staff are encouraged to update contact information, verify the health and safety of employee and employee families
- Contact Karen Zackfia, Director of Business regarding applicable leaves of absence
- o Absence reasons will be tracked through Final Forms and AESOP. Staff will be asked to respond on leave requests if they experience any of the following: fever and/or chills, shortness of breath, cough, fatigue, muscle aches, loss of taste or smell, sore throat, nausea, vomiting. Student symptoms will be tracked through Final Forms. By tracking symptoms, we will be able to assist with contract tracing should someone be confirmed to have contracted COVID-19.
- Superintendent and/or Lana Wynn will notify the Newton County Health Dept. to report positive cases and to the IDOE. This is accomplished through the ISDH portal for tracking purposes.
- o Continued training on symptoms of COVID-19, prevention techniques and district/school procedures
- Continued training of custodial and maintenance staff on effective methods of cleaning and disinfecting work and play areas and the time schedules for cleaning.
- o Continue to monitor whole staff gatherings/meetings, social distancing, wear masks, break down into smaller groups when possible
- Vendors continue to be monitored entering building
- o Hand sanitizer and masks are plentiful at each building. Teachers and staff should talk with their building custodian to secure supplies.

## to School

#### **District and School Considerations:**

- Students and employees should be excluded from school if they test positive for COVID-19 or exhibit one or more of the symptoms of COVID-19 based on CDC Guidance that is not otherwise explained (fever or 100.4 degrees F or greater; cough; shortness of breath or difficulty breathing; chills; repeated shaking with chills; muscle pain; headache; sore throat; new loss of taste or smell)
- Once excluded, they may return if they satisfy the recommendations of the CDC and ISDH

#### Instructional **Model and** Flexibility
